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peaking engagement. The Meeting was sponsored by the Voice of Women.

Described as a man with controversial views who once said he was in favor of atheist and free-love campus clubs to stimulate thought and discussion, Prof. Sibley was interviewed by immigration officials at Winnipeg on his arrival last Friday.

There was a "doubt as to his admissibility, which legally we had to recognize," said Mr. Nicholson, just back from an on-the-spot investigation of the whole affair.

It was the kind of doubt that would have to go before an inquiry, he said.

Unfortunately, this meant "the choice the law allowed us to offer Mr. Sibley was academic from his point of view. The inquiry could not be held before he was due to speak. He therefore preferred to leave again rather than to wait and have the doubt about his admissibility resolved."

Mr. Nicholson read pertinent sections of the Immigration Act. One bars persons "who are or have been members of groups advocating 'subversion by force or other means of democratic government, institutions or processes as they are understood in Canada.'"

Another bars persons when there are "reasonable grounds for believing" they might advocate such subversion.

Another section was that a person must "answer truthfully

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and continue to extend the war to North Viet Nam and Laos." The Viet Cong were declared ready to fight 20 years or more if necessary.

SAID CHILD WOUNDED

The North Vietnamese radio station also complained that three U.S. and South Vietnamese warships shelled a coastal village called Cam Binh. Without identifying the targets there, it said a child was wounded. There was no confirmation here of such a raid.

Eight South Vietnamese Sky-raidors and a U.S. jet escort of unannounced strength took part in the 11th air attack on North Viet Nam.

The main job of the Americans evidently was to suppress anti-aircraft fire, which was described as heavy.

The South Vietnamese spokesman said all planes returned safely from the 75-minute operation, though one experienced engine trouble. Communist dispatches relayed from Hanoi declared two or three were shot down.

The main target was a complex of two-storey buildings making up the radar station at Dong Hoi, 45 miles north

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song. When we cross the line into Montgomery—we shall have overcome."

Montgomery police mapped out a march route for today through the heart of the business district. They co-ordinated their traffic control with the federalized national guardsmen and army regulars escorting the marchers under presidential directive.
