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The Ice Age Commence

In case you don't have enough to worry about these days, now comes a report by British scientists that the world is entering another ice age.

Worse still, the onslaught of this latest frigid epoch may come suddenly with a massive blitz of snow, rather than the traditional slow creep of the polar ice cap toward the equator, a process which can take centuries.

The latest evidence suggests that ice ages occur much more frequently than previously suspected, and one is long overdue right now. If things were on schedule, Leningrad, Glasgow and Toronto — not to mention Sydney, Mabou, and Middle River — should be under thirty feet of ice.

The cost of running Parliament will come to \$51,000,000 during the current fiscal year, an increase of 18 per cent over the cost a year ago. Last year's cost represented an increase of 26 per cent over the year before.

Which leaves the taxpayer wondering whether he should condemn Parliament for its inflationary spending or praise it for reducing the annual increase.

— SPEAKER RULES —

Following unsuccessful objections by Finance Minister John Turner and House Leader Mitchell Sharp against one of his rulings, Speaker James Jerome's authority is now firmly established. However much a member disagrees with his rulings, they cannot be challenged.

The ruling concerned the right of parliamentary secretaries to ask questions during the daily question period. Despite precedents set by former speakers, Mr. Jerome, himself once a parliamentary secretary, denied them that right.

The ruling doesn't matter as much as the challenge that followed. Even the mildest argument against a speaker's decision, especially from the treasury benches, tends to undermine his authority. If he is to preside over orderly debate, his judgments must be accepted.
