NEWS FROM WATERFORD

Doings of New Waterford's Council

The town council of New Waterford held their regular meeting in the town hall Tuesday November 1st. The meeting was a very interesting one. Mayor Ling was in the chair and all the councillors were present. A number of bills were ordered paid.

Among other matters dealt with was that of a woman residing in a letter, that her husband was an invalid and received a pension from the Workmen's Compensation Board in Halifax and gave her a cent of said pension received for the support of herself and their little children, but spent it in a not very good way, and asked the council for their assistance in getting some of this money as she was left to earn the full support of the family which she could not do. It is to be hoped that the council will find way to deal with such a character.

One of the councillors gave information, that owing to illness of the Inspector under the N.S.T.A., the league was getting plentiful. As the old saying goes, "When the cat is out the mouse is playing in the pantry."

The Chief of Police was called and asked if the Police force would not be able to look after this matter until the Inspector could be read again, but he did not seem to be clear on this matter. One thing did he know and it was that if any police officer had suspicion of liquor being sold at any house or store they could seize it, provided the occupants of the place did not take the door. The council was determined and it was moved seconded and carried, that the town council proceed to close every bar-room in New Waterford. The citizens of this town will be watching with interest the doings of the council in this matter. It is a good thing the fishing season is over, for if the council make good their threats, all the fish within seven miles of the coast will be intoxicated.

Councillor Ausden was greatly in favor of the enactment of the curfew law in this town and again the Chief of Police was called and asked for his opinion on this matter. He stated that owing to the many whistles blowing every night, the Coal Company had ceased to blow one at the usual time in honor of the Curfew Law, as it would cause confusion. It also caused the police officers great trouble to determine the age of children travelling on the streets at night, so some time a very small fellow was over sixteen years of age and a very big fellow only twelve or thirteen. This, surely such disadvantage could be overcome by sending some of the police force to a municipal institution in Halifax for a term, as it should be possible for them to learn how to get a reasonable idea of the age of a child by looking in the mouth, behind the ear or somewhere else. If this should fail there could be some kind of tag similar to dog tags, whereon the age of a child could be hammered, such tag could be carried on a string around the neck as a jewel. This would increase the good looks of any girl or boy. If one of the above suggestions should prove successful, our Councillor Ausden would then have to be the credit that at least the little children would be speeded, appearing the filthy dirty remarks respectable men and women have to hear, from the older and more advanced portion of the younger element who occupy drug shops and house-masters, when they after dark, are travelling on Plummer Avenue.

No Profanees Allowed

SYDNEY, N.S.W. (Federated Press) The New South Wales Labor government is introducing a comprehensive scheme of folder conservation as a means of eradicating bush fires. The plan will be divided into districts, under local committees, with a board of control. Rural interests and the governments will jointly finance the scheme, which will require \$25,000,000 in five years, when it is hoped it will become self-supporting.

Control depots for the reception and storage of folders will be established wherever required and folders will be purchased and stored at these depots.

Big Rally in New Waterford

New Waterford, Nov. 7, 1921

What can scarcely be termed as the greatest political meeting ever held in the town of New Waterford was held in the U.M.W. Hall here last night when the Labor candidates, J. B. McArthur, assisted by the fighting Alderman, Angus G. McDonald, town Ward V. Sydney, and some of the local Labor officials, opened the election campaign here. The spirit and determination to overthrow the old regime was clearly felt and shown by the tremendous cheers the speakers received.

When the meeting came to a close at eleven o'clock, there was a shout, "we will stay here all night if you will continue to inform us as to the actual doings of the old parties" and there is no doubt as to the actual doings of the voters of New Waterford on December 6th when every ballot counts.

Mr. Arthur Barker occupied the chair and introduced the speakers. The Labor mayor, Jas. Ling gave a few remarks and advised the meeting to put a solid vote for the Labor Party, either on December 6th, this Wednesday is a long-anticipated speaker, but has shown a good many years that he is solid with Labor. Mr. John D. Gilles and Wm. McKay also gave short addresses but declared that this was the time of the Labor candidate and his lieutenant, "The Fighting Alderman of Sydney."

The A.O.H. Band rendered valuable assistance by playing several numbers. This band, all sturdy workmen, deserves a lot of credit for the manner in which they made by the cause of Labor. They voluntarily held the funeral procession of a deceased fellow workman, regardless of creed, color or nationality. They head the procession when Labor men march through the town to demonstrate their best cause and they stay at Labor meetings to help to keep up the spirit and enthusiasm, and all this without receiving one cent for their valuable services.

The Labor candidate when advancing to the front of the platform was received with cheers and handclaps. Your reporter quickly threw up his hands, declaring that it would take a very good stenographer to write down the long and convincing statements backed by facts and figures as to the regime of the old parties of Liberals and Conservatives, when in turn in power at Sydney. He stated the most that protection did to the workmen by showing how the combined manufacturing concerns in Canada, for one year, paid to over five hundred thousand men and women and children in wages millions of dollars less than they received in net profits themselves, and how the protection of the people had landed hundreds of millions of dollars in cash out of the government treasury and millions of tons of the most valuable bush, of Canada to Railroad companies and other friends, together with other important privileges, so they were well protected and provided for in their old age, but when the toilers of the soil, mines and workmen asked for protection in the form of old age pensions, widows and orphans allowances, then all protection talk stopped at once. This protection for workmen was to provide them with lots of bare bones of hard labor and short rations and at last, ground enough for bread.

Angus G. McDonald of Sydney gave a lengthy and interesting address on conditions in Sydney from his incarceration all over and had many times great trouble to be heard on account of the cheer and cheering when he gave proof of how the old parties of Sydney protected the workmen by giving the Steel Corporation all they asked for by nothing, and exempted them from taxation for a long period of years, and the Steel Corporation in return protected their workmen by giving them eleven hours of work by day and thirteen by night and to finish off on Saturday, when the laborer had to go to night work, change of shift from day to night work, labor plan with twenty-four hours work without a break. No wonder that a lot of sleeping is done in the Churches on Sundays in Sydney. C. Strain

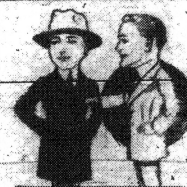
